Paddock/Pasture Safety



Fencing

- Inspect fencing regularly.
- Repair breaks ASAP and remove any sharp protrusions.
- Consider including electric fencing.
- Always use fencing that is safe for horses!

Paddock Danger

- Inspect paddocks regularly and have a <u>mud</u> <u>management plan</u>.
- Trim trees before fallen branches cause issues.
- Avoid overstocking paddocks and mixing conflicting personalities.
- Look for foreign objects like lost shoes, rocks, sharp objects, etc.

Plant Life

• Be familiar with <u>local</u> <u>poisonous plant life</u>



• Remove poisonous plants and dispose of safely.

Hay Feeders Inspect regularly for



- Place feeders on even, flat ground.
- Use horse-safe hay feeders, and avoid cattle hay feeders.

damage/sharp protrusions.

- Clean away old hay.
- Remove baling twine when placing a new bale.

Wildlife

- Some wildlife carry diseases that can affect your horses.
- Groundhogs and gophers can create holes in fields.
- Check section 8.2 of the <u>Biosecurity Standard for the</u> <u>Equine Sector</u> for management tips.

Water Troughs



- Ensure access to clean water 00 24/7.
- Do not rely on snow as a water source.
- Rivers, streams, etc., can carry harmful things downstream, so avoid access to sources like these.
